ETBU NUMBERS FOR THIS FALL WERE EXCITING...

ur final enrollment for Fall 2020 stands at 1,714 students, 121 students ahead of Fall 2019, a 7.6% increase and a new all-time enrollment record in our 108-year history.

Undergraduate enrollment is up 6%, at 1,565 students, with 1,266 full-time undergraduate students, which is a 3% increase compared to Fall 2019. Adult Education enrollment rose 8% over last year.

Our on-campus residential population is over 95% occupancy, with dedicated space for isolation.

First-time freshmen enrollment is 403, up 17% over Fall 2019. Three out of the last four years, we have enjoyed a full-time freshmen total at 400 or more.

Graduate student enrollment set a new record high with 149 students, which is a 22% increase over last Fall. New graduate student enrollment is up 42 students, an increase of 105%.

We had our second consecutive returning undergraduate retention of 84%, which is 3% above our five-year average. This trend translates down the road with persistence to higher graduation rates.

IN MEMORIAM



Abe Bush

Abe Alfred Bush Jr., 78, passed away peacefully Aug. 3, 2020, in Granbury, Texas. He had Parkinson's disease (20-plus years) and dementia (8 years). Abe was the son of Abe and Benzlee Thomas Bush of Cartwright/ Colbert, Okla. After World War II, they settled in Arlington, Texas.

Abe is a graduate of Arlington HS (1960), Arlington State College (1966) BA in History, and TCU (1970) Master's in Education. He met his wife of 53 years, Annette Layton, while in college, and they married May 27, 1967. His work career started as an athletic trainer/ teacher at Garland HS, then manager of ride operations at Astroworld. He returned to being athletic trainer/teacher at Southwest HS in Fort Worth. From there he took a position as assistant director of Admissions at UTA.

Abe eventually saw an opportunity to start his own business. His entrepreneurial spirit drew him to the cap and gown industry, supplying graduation regalia to high schools, colleges and universities. His travels as a salesman took him throughout Texas and surrounding states. He could tell you without a map, how to get from point A to B. If there were any historical stops along the way, he'd make sure you knew about them. He loved Texas history. If you traveled in the '80s, you might have heard his CB radio call sign of "Easy Rider" pointing out speed traps or asking for information. Abe was a longtime member of SWCBA and TACRAO, awarded TACRAO Honorary Membership in 1978. Always proud and supportive of his son and daughter, he coached their soccer teams, encouraged their career choices, shared the joys of their accomplishments and wonderful families. He enjoyed golf, travel, reading the newspaper and watching sports on TV. He will be missed by many and is now free of the debilitating effects of Parkinson's disease.

He is survived by wife, Annette; Son Abe III, wife, Gayle, and their daughter, Taylor; daughter, Arlinda, her son, Pecos. and daughter, Dillan; brother, Lee and wife, Beverly, and Emma; sisters-in-law, Pam and Denise; plus many nieces, nephews, cousins and friends. Abe unselfishly willed his body to The University of North Texas Health Science Center in Fort Worth for further research.



Joey Chandler

Joey Brand Chandler, age 66, passed away on September 25, 2020. She was born on November 8, 1953 in Dallas, Texas. After graduating from Mesquite High School in Mesquite, TX, Joey attended East Texas State University, now known as Texas A&M University- Commerce, where she graduated with Bachelor of Science and Master of Science degrees. As a college student Joey participated in the Alpha Delta Pi sorority as well as other service organizations.

Joey dedicated her professional career to helping college students achieve their college dreams. She worked for East Texas State University from 1977 to 1979 as a School Relations Advisor, and for Trinity Valley Community College from 1979 to 1984 as the Director of School Relations. She then moved to Sam Houston State University where she served as the Assistant Director of Admissions from 1984 to 1992, the Director of Undergraduate Admissions from 1992 to 2005 and Director of the Sam Houston Visitor's Center from 2005 to 2009.

During her time at SHSU, she helped the university achieve record enrollment growth, and was often recognized for her leadership, school spirit, and frequent Bearkat orange outfits. Throughout her professional career, Joey served on numerous statewide organizations including the Texas Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers (TACRAO), where she held numerous positions and was awarded Honorary Membership in 2009.

Joey was a faithful servant of God and was a lifetime member of the Church of Christ and attended the Huntsville Church of Christ, where she met her husband King who she married in December 1987. Together, they were actively involved in supporting youth group activities, feeding college students at the Kats for Christ student center, participating in Share Groups, and visiting the sick and shut-ins of the congregation.
